This man reflects like no other how any SCV full or associate member shall be: a true Southerner by the heart and conscious of what he is and what he does to preserve Southern and Confederate heritage. Read these lines by Javier Prieto, Spain:

Dear brothers and friends of the Europe Camp,

allow me to introduce myself full of honor and pride for being a new associated member of SCV Camp #1612. That's truly important to me, because since I was about 14/15 years old I always felt close to the ideals oft the Confederacy. Perhaps an American compatriot cannot fully understand why I man in Spain does identify himself as a Southerner. Let me explain that to you.

I always had an interest in History, especially in Military History and the surroundings (mean the causes of a war and the true intentions behind). Well, so I started studying the true causes for the so-called American Civil War (I prefer to say War of Northern Aggression). By doing research I found out how many lies and falsehoods the Yankees had created against the Confederacy, with the intention to trample into the dust the greatest entity of freedom since the original United States were created. From that moment on I knew that I wanted to be a Southerner, a true Confederate, till the end of my days, because the South stands for all that I do believe in and will love for the rest of my life: tradition, righteous manners, Christianity, truly lived in God the Lord. Thus, I feel, I am and will ever be a true Confederate man. I salute the CSA and revere the Constitution of 1861.

The South has a strong military tradition. I am similar in that, too. Aged 18, I volunteered for service in the Spanish Army out of love for my country and for the virtues of the Confederate soldier: God, Honor, Rightfulness and Chivalry, that's what I felt.

I served for 4 years (1986/1990) in the 46th Mountain Artillery Regiment (5th Mountain Division "Navarra") and became a Corporal, leading the crew of a 105mm Howitzer (105/26). I also qualified in explosive ordnance, Fire Direction Control, heavy automatic weapons (machine guns) and got the marksmanship badge. I left the Army with a meritorious mention.

Now I'm 46 and continue in love with the South, more than ever. Becoming an associate to the SCV Europe Camp means a great honor to me, involving much pride and a sense of privilege. Be assured that by entering as an associate one of the world's oldest heritage preservation organizations, the Sons of Confederate Veterans, I'll give my best to defend and to preserve faith, culture and traditions of the South and the good name of the soldiers who defended that all fighting in the Confederate Army. God is on our side and so is the truth. I'll fight no longer alone, and that's good.

From June 2011 Bertil Haggman has been publishing his book manuscript on "Confederate Irregular Warfare, 1861 – 1865".online. You can access it ont the same website address: http://grayguerrillas.wordpress.com/

The manuscript is organized in chapters for each state of the Confederacy (as well as one for California, one for the Indian Territory and one for Confederate units, which comprised companies from more than one Confederate state). At the end of each chapter there is a bibliographic note. A full bibliography is also included at the end of the manuscript. The total number of pages is about 500.

The irregular units and commands of the Confederacy played a decisive role in the war 1861 – 1865. This war was not only a mighty clash of large armies. Many Confederates in the spring of 1861 would have liked to fight as guerrillas. As during the American Revolution guerrillas could help defend against invading armies.

They could distract Union armies from their primary objectives, injure morale of the enemy and force him to detail defensive forces for the protection of railroads and river traffic.

The whole book manuscript will not be published at the same time. Instead sections will be published electronically from beginning to end as blog contributions. I have chosen the Sesquicentennial of the WBTS 1861 to 1865 to introduce this work on Confederate Irregular Warfare electronically.

WORDPRESS REPORT ON THE BLOG 2012



CSS ALABAMA AZORES PLAQUE NEWS

I am delighted to announce, the wording and design of our plaque commemorating the spot where the CSS Alabama was commissioned into the Confederate Navy is now finalised. Members of the 290 Foundation attended a special ceremony in Angra do Heroismo, Terceira, last August, marking the 150th anniversary of the event which took place there, at sea on Sunday, August 24th 1862. An illuminated manuscript was dedicated on that occasion pending the erection of the plaque in a permanent position. The commemorative plaque will be sited appropriately on the harbour wall overlooking the bay and almost directly opposite the town's Misericordia Catholic church where Raphael Semmes, Captain of the CSS Alabama and others most likely worshipped. It has been agreed the dedication ceremony will be attended by both the Catholic and Anglican churches. I will be announcing full details on the timing of the dedication later as his occasion will provide the 290 Foundation an opportunity to formally recognise the contribution and sacrifice, sailors from the United Kingdom and Europe made during the American Civil War.



On 24th August 1862, the Confederate Cruiser, CSS Alabama was commissioned in these waters by Captain Raphael Semmes, CSN.

Over the next twenty-two months the Alabama cruised the whaling grounds around the Azores, the shipping lanes along the eastern seaboard of America, the Caribbean, the Brazilian coast, along South Africa, the Indian Ocean, South China Sea and Bay of Bengal, boarding 447 vessels, capturing 65 Union merchant vessels abd sinking the USS. Hatteras. She was at sea for 534 of the 657 days of her life. During this time she took 2,000 prisoners with no loss of life. Her final engagement and ultimate sinking was with the USS Kearsarge at Cherbourg on 19th June 1864.

This plaque remembers those seamen from Great Britain and Europe, who served the peoples of all America during the Civil War of 1861-1865 and who by singular choice and selfless endeavour, gave their lives on the worlds' oceans in pursuit of freedom for all.

SOUTHERN LADIES AND THE "WEARING" OF THE FLAG

When the Civil War began in 1861 Sarah Fowler Morgan lived in Louisiana's capitol Baton Rouge. One of eight children from a wealthy family, almost twenty-years old, she lived on Church Street (now 4th Street). Sarah started her diary in 1862. She began with retrospective entries about her grief in the war's first year, describing the loss of her closest brother to a duel and her father to an asthma attack. Her account of her family's War experiences was published in 1913 as *A Confederate Girl's Diary*. (Editor's note: this diary will soon be available in our digital Camp Library).

In April, 1862, New Orleans was under Union control and in May Union ships were on the Mississippi River near Sarah's house preparing to take over the state capitol. Sarah made a Confederate flag, stitched up as the Yankees entered the city in 1862; a combination of piecing and appliqué, based on patchwork, inspired by a 19th-century sampler. She wore it over her shoulder.

May 10, 1862. Baton Rouge

"We, too, have been having our fun. Early in the evening, four more gunboats sailed up here. We saw them from the corner....The American flag was flying from every peak. It was received in profound silence, by the hundreds gathered on the banks. I could hardly refrain from a groan. Much as I once loved that flag, I hate it now! I came back and made myself a Confederate flag about five inches long, slipped the staff in my belt, pinned the flag to my shoulder, and walked downtown, to the consternation of women and children, who expected something awful to follow. An old negro cried, 'My young missus got her flag flyin', anyhow!' Nettie made one and hid it in the folds of her dress. But we were the only two who ventured."

Martha Booton was a fellow rebel girl. Like Sarah, she made the CSA First National Flag a part of her daily wear. Her apron is in the collection of the Museum of the Confederacy. It looks almost identical to the creation depicted in the Harper's Weekly scene. See the below:

EDUCATIONAL MOVIES





Plot synopsis: It's 1867, former Union Captain Gideon (Pierce Brosnan) is a man on the run who is chased by Carver (Liam Neeson), a former Confederate Colonel. Carver is serious about catching Gideon to avenge a terrible war crime Gideon committed against his family and his homestead in the past. The film chase moves from snow-cowered mountains to the desert as Gideon is being hunted for many miles before both men finally confront each other and the origin of the seek for revenge is revealed. The end is rather surprising and surrealistic.

<u>Analysis:</u> The plot of this very average western movie is really simple, a man seeks for bloody revenge and the chase leads to numerous adventures and violence in different places. Leeson as Carver and Brosnan as Guideon are certainly not playing Oscar-deserving parts (originally Richard Gere was going to play Gideon, probably leaning to the fact the audience loved him in "Somersby", but he pulled out and Pierce Brosnan took his place). Guideon's ability to survive in the wilderness and by handling the enormous Bowie knife (surprise to come about!) is the proper of a frontiersman, not the Yankee he is supposed to be.

The short appearances of Angelica Huston and Wes Studi as part of the surrealistic ending are anecdotal and not interesting. So far, there is nothing else to say. But interesting to us is always the Southern point of view. How are Confederates and their motives portrayed?

The movie introduces a man-hunting Posse of paid gunmen lead by Carver. The audience does not know at first why Guideon is chased like an animal with so much hate. The whole movie, which never achieves more dramatic and artistic quality that one of a good TV-film, is full of brutal scenes, but we don't know the motives. Interesting is that actor Michael Wincott plays the role of one of Carver's hired gunmen. Wincott is one of modern Hollywood's "bad guys" in his roles, as shown in many movies like "1492", "The Crow", etc. And throughout the movie Carver is shown as a man who has lost his faith in God, even led to ruthlessness by hate and thirst for revenge. But why?

Final confrontation at the end of the movie reveals the causes; Carver and Gideon recall the events. After the War had already ended, Captain Gideon was ordered to take reprisals on former Confederate officers. When he arrives at Seraphim Falls, the farm where Carver lives with his family (wife, a teen-aged son and a baby), Carver is out in the fields with his elder son. His wife lies to the Yankees and says her husband is not at home. To coerce her, Gideon orders their barn to be set on fire. The blaze quickly spreads to the main house, as Carver emerges from the fields. Interrogated about his men, he says he has dissolved his command, the men went home. While the bluecoat soldiers still question him, his wife and son run inside the house to save the baby. Trapped by the flames, no Yankee helps, all three perish while Carver is forced to watch.

Gideon is presented as racked with guilt over the tragedy - but in reality that was seldom the case. Southern homes were burnt by orders, in Virginia, Missouri, the Carolinas, Georgia and more places throughout the South and collateral civilian casualties were seen as "too bad, too bad" cases.


The end of the movie is surrealistic and rather disturbing. The encounter with the mysterious Indian (Wes Studi) trading the horse in benefit of revenge and hate, and the devilish lady (Angelica Houston) trading a bullet and a handgun with the same purpose of seeing the hate executed to an deathly end, leads to the movie's climax and revealing of the cause, but suddenly the film ends and both men disappear: they vanish from the screen while walking in the desert. No explanation, no logical end. All in one, a strange western movie we cannot recommend, but only remember to you the only thing to keep in mind while watching: the fact that the horrible thing that happened to Colonel Carver's family happened but too often to many families in the South. But Christian love and forgiveness prevailed in most cases after the War. The horrors were forgotten and America grew strong.



The movie has a rather strange and surrealistic ending, with no apologizing, no revenge. After the depicted scene, both men vanish from the screen.

CAMP LIBRARY

Autobiography of Samuel S. Hildebrand, the renowned Missouri Bushwhacker, State Times Books, Jefferson City, Mo.1870



"Soon after arriving in town we heard of a company of Federals on Lost creek under Capt. Leeper, and taking our informant for a guide we marched at once to give them a fight. Reaching there about sunrise the next morning we charged their camp, running their pickets in at full speed, fought them only a few minutes, when those who had not got into the brush surrendered. In the fight we lost four men killed and six wounded, the latter, however, all recovered. Of the enemy we killed fifteen, wounded eight, and took ten prisoners beside the wounded. Our booty consisted of forty-four guns, sixty pistols, forty horses, four hundred dollars in greenbacks, and other articles of value to us and to our families." (pages 185-186)

The autobiography of Missouri Bushwhacker Sam Hildebrand is a fascinating read. Hildebrand is lesser known than Quantrill, Anderson, Todd and others. But it's hard to understand why, considering his tenacity and successes against Unionists was no less astounding than the other, more famous guerilla chiefs.

Hildebrand was also a remarkable rifleman, his marksmanship deadly accurate and he often operated in an ambush mode behind enemy lines, much like a modern sniper would. He claimed nearly one hundred kills with his rifle, "kill devil."
